Chairman's Report

This year has been as good as any recent years. We, the committee, decided against running trips for Halloween and the Santa Cruises as there was so much competition that the work of decorating the boat and other work involved was not rewarded by the number of passengers we were able to attract. We decided to try running trips on into October but this was not a success.

This spring The George Watson Buck was due for its lift out and blacking. Brian was able to get funding toward crane hire from the Tirgwynt Community Fund, IWA, SUCS and the Friends of The Montgomery Canal.

At previous lift outs we had spoken to the foreman of the BW yard who allowed us to crane out near to the Visitor Centre. Under CRT control this did not work and we were asked for nearly £1000 for the use of the yard for the week! Michael Limbrey was able to put us in touch with Ani Sutton of CRT who, after a meeting with Brian and myself, was able to get these charges waived. GWB was lifted out at the end of May and painted under near ideal conditions. Thanks to all who helped.

Passengers continue to be a mix of locals, holiday makers from the Vyrnwy caravan site, walkers from the Offa's Dyke trail and canal enthusiasts. This year the plant sale has been extended to a summer long event which

is bringing in a steady income. The ladies have planted up the Chris Backshall memorial trough which



has brought a splash of colour to the wharf. Membership remains at about 35, with several new members including Jenny and Norman Harris who have become very active members of the team.

I thank everyone for their efforts.

Visitor Centre

This year started rather slowly as Easter was early, and the weather had not had a chance to warm up.

The plans for the centre are to make it as attractive as possible, not easy as it is an old stable.

In memory of our past chairman, Chris Backshall, a wooden planter was bought and filled with daffodils. A variety of plants were added after the daffodils had faded.

This was the start; we filled pots with flowers, and with help from volunteers a permanent plant sale area was created. This has proved not only decorative but profitable.

The centre has been cleaned and restocked. A few new items have been added to the canal ware, and favourites that have sold well have



been replaced. As well as sweets, drinks and ice creams we can now offer pot

noodles and cuppa soups, giving our visitors more variety.

The inside of the centre is sadly looking a little the worse for wear, but hopefully there is a plan to lime wash the walls and repaint the doors. Watch this space!

The BIG Lift


On Monday May 21st the crane arrived to lift out the George Watson Buck, so that it could be cleaned up and painted below the water mark. There were plenty of onlookers, including the children from the Border Preschool, who were really interested in the

proceedings.



Once out, Roy Mansell, Brian Lawson, Tim Brunsden and Ann Jones made a start on getting rid of all the algae and loose rust; this took a surprisingly short time, so by lunch time we were able to have a break while the boat dried out and then we could restart. In the afternoon we were joined by Alan Barnes, so the job took even less time.

The second coat of paint was applied on the Wednesday and on the Thursday, a third coat. On Friday the crane returned to put the boat back in the water, resplendent in its new paintwork. The pre-school came back to watch, but unfortunately the boat was already back in the water. The children had drawn pictures of the boat being taken out of the water and brought us copies of their artwork to put up in the Visitor Centre.

We are very grateful to the Tirgwynt Community Fund, SUCS, IWA, and the Friends of the Montgomery for providing us with the funds to hire the crane to get the GWB out of the water and back. The total cost was nigh on £2000.

Some 'George Watson Buck' History



The boat was built in 1997/98 by the apprentices and staff at JCB Ltd. under the direction of Simon Piper. This group were apparently a work's club who called themselves "The Navigators" although I am not entirely sure about this point. However, the boat was loaned to the North Staffs Handicapped Boat Committee in May 1998 with a licence to use it for charitable purposes as set out in the licence agreement. During the next four years the boat did sterling service with the Committee, carrying almost 2000 special needs children per year on the Caldon Canal in the Churnet Valley. In early 2002 the Committee was wound up and passed its assets to the Beatrice Charity and at this time the Charity was just bringing into service its refitted holiday boat for use as a modern day boat. The Charity therefore decided that the "Lady B" would only be used as a reserve boat and wouldn't be worth the cost of licence, mooring and insurance. It was therefore decided to hand back the boat. This was done, after repainting it and it was then left moored in Red Bull Basin for the next three years, virtually abandoned until finally being taken over by SUCS for use at Llanymynech, when it was renamed 'George Watson Buck' after the engineer who worked on the Monty in the early 1800s and was responsible for the repairs of the Vyrnwy Aqueduct.
